Singapore Raptor Report Spring Migration, March 2012

Summary for migrant species:

In March, a total of 58 migrant raptors of 12 species were recorded. The **Jerdon's Baza** surprised us again as it was the second most numerous migrant raptor with 9 individuals! Lim Kim Seng reported 7 birds at Changi on the 4th and Alfred Chia had another 2 at Lorong Halus during the Annual Bird Census on the 11th, which also extended the late date by 5 days.

The rarity of the month goes to the **Common Kestrel** – a female seen and photographed by Alvan Buckley at Jurong on the 23rd. Other birders also managed to see it on the subsequent few days. Surprisingly, a juvenile **Rufous-bellied Eagle** turned up at Goldhill Avenue and was photographed. The previous record was at Bukit Timah summit in January.

The most numerous migrant raptor was the **Black Baza** with 27 birds. The **Oriental Honey Buzzard** was relegated to the third spot, with 5 birds. Next was the **Chinese Sparrowhawk** with 4 birds – Alan Owyong witnessed 2 birds "in aerial display" over Changi. There were 3 **Peregrine Falcon** and 2 **Japanese Sparrowhawk**. The 2 wintering **Common Buzzard** were reported by Frankie Cheong to be present at Changi on most days during the first week and were still at there on the 8th. The harriers were not recorded last month, so it was good that Lim Kim Seng recorded 2 **Eastern Marsh Harrier** (EMH) and 1 male **Pied Harrier** on the 4th, at Tanah Merah. Lee Tiah Khee also photographed 2 EMHs – a male and a juvenile – on the 15th. There was also an **Osprey** at Sungei Mandai.

Highlights for sedentary species:

A juvenile **Grey-headed Fish Eagle** was perched near it nest with an adult, an indication of successful breeding. The rare **Crested Serpent Eagle** was still around at Goldhill Avenue. There were good records of the rare **Crested Goshawk**, including an adult at the Botanic Gardens and a juvenile at Bidadari, feeding on a skink. Healthy numbers of the **Changeable Hawk-eagle** were reported across the island. Other resident raptors recorded include the **White-bellied Sea Eagle, Brahminy Kite** and **Black-winged Kite.**
