# 6th Singapore Raptor Watch Report

## Autumn 2013 Migration - 3 Nov 2013

The 6th Singapore raptor watch was held on Sunday, 3 November 2012 and involved 54 participants across eight sites, including Chek Jawa, on Pulau Ubin, off the northeastern coast.

The day started well with fine weather. True to its name 'Central Catchment Nature Reserve', rain hit the Jelutong Tower around 13:00 hrs forcing the team there to take shelter and end the count. Luckily the other sites were spared. The peak period for raptor activity was between 11:00 to 13:00 hrs.




Figure 2: Raptor numbers by 1-hour time periods

The richest site in terms of number of raptors was Tuas South followed by Kent Ridge Park, same as the year before.

The 292 migrant raptors were identified to nine species and another 31 probable migrants were un-identified. Tuas South had the highest count of 165 migrant raptors, followed by Kent Ridge Park with 54.

The nine migrant species recorded included rarities such as a single **Common Kestrel** seen and photographed at Tuas South as it burst into the open spaces suddenly at 15:00 hrs, chasing after small birds. The hunt failed and it started to circle, allowing time for observers to have a good look at it.

Other less common migrant raptors included a **Common Buzzard** and a **Booted Eagle**, both at Pulau Punggol.

As for the resident species, the **Crested Goshawks** were once again recorded at Kent Ridge Park.




Figure 4: Raptor Sub-totals by Site

The richest site, by migrant species, was shared by Pulau Punggol, Kent Ridge Park and Tuas South, with 6 migrant species. The other sites had between 1 to 5 migrant species.




Figure 5: Species Richness by Site

The most numerous migrant raptor was the **Oriental Honey Buzzard** with 140 birds, a drop of 70% compared to last year. The **Black Baza** was a distant second with 63 birds. In third place was the **Japanese Sparrowhawk** with 59 birds, almost three times last year's numbers. Next was the **Chinese Sparrowhawk** with 21 birds, similar to last year. There was 1 **Common Buzzard**, 1 **Booted Eagle**, 3 **Peregrine Falcons**, 3 **Ospreys** and a single **Common Kestrel**. There were another 31 unidentified raptors.

The most numerous resident raptor was the **Brahminy Kite** with 52 birds, followed by the **White-bellied Sea Eagle** with 36 and the **Changeable Hawk Eagle** with 13. There were 10 **Black-winged Kites** and 3 **Grey-headed Fish Eagles**. The 3 **Crested Goshawks** showed up at Kent Ridge; two were seen there the previous two years and are probably holding territory there.

Note: numbers for resident raptors, especially the top two, may be over-stated. The possibility of the same birds re-appearing more than once cannot be ruled out.

440 raptors counted, including:292 migrant raptors.31 Unidentified raptors117 resident raptors.

#### **Number of species**

15 species counted, including:9 migrant species.6 resident species.
