## Singapore Raptor Report Autumn Migration, October 2010

## **Summary for migrant species:**

A total of 139 migrant raptors from 8 species were recorded this month. Oriental Honey Buzzards took the top spot with 108 birds. Peter Jones counted 62 of these birds in a 45 minutes period from 11:45am to 24 12:30pm Tuas on October. Japanese Sparrowhawks came in second in terms of numbers with a total of 12. The third placing was a surprise as it went to the uncommon Chinese Sparrowhawk. Present in small numbers were the **Ospreys**. Sun Chong Hong had been expecting the Peregrine Falcon that he had seen in Spring 2009, Autumn 2009 and Spring 2010 in Bishan. The falcon arrived on the 11<sup>th</sup> and perched, as usual, on top of a high rise building. For 3 species, there was only a single sighting. A juvenile Eastern Marsh Harrier was seen at Changi on the 9<sup>th</sup> by Tan Kok Hui, Danny Lau and Con Foley. The Common Buzzard made it into this month with a single bird at the usual hangout – Changi – on the 30<sup>th</sup>, by Danny Lau and Lau Jia Sheng. On the last day of the month, Alfred Chia recorded 2 Black Bazas at Seletar West.

## **Highlights for sedentary species:**

The Bird Race on Pulau Ubin on the produced two interesting records for resident raptors. A rare Crested Serpent Eagle was seen by Alan Owyong and his team, flying across Ubin's main village just after noon. The other notable record was that of 2 Grey-headed Fish Eagles - a juvenile and a sub-adult. This appears to be the first record of this species for Pulau Ubin. An even greater rarity the Crested Goshawk - re-appeared at the Singapore Zoo. The last sighting of this species at the same location was that of a juvenile. This time it was an adult.
